About...

Jenny Sanford

First Lady Jenny Sanford was born and raised in Winnetka, Illinois and has a bachelor's degree in finance from Georgetown University. After college, she worked for the investment banking firm Lazard Freres & Co in New York from 1984 through 1990, including serving as vice president in mergers and acquisitions.

The Sanfords then moved from New York to the Charleston area where Mrs. Sanford balanced raising a family, managing her husband Mark's political campaigns and being active in the non-profit community. In 1994, Mrs. Sanford managed her husband Mark's successful campaign for Congress, the couple's first foray into the political arena. Mrs. Sanford also managed his winning gubernatorial campaign in 2002, assisted him daily at the Statehouse during his first term as governor, and co-managed his successful reelection in 2006.

At the Governor's Mansion, Mrs. Sanford has completely reorganized operations, resulting in significant savings to the taxpayers. With the help of the Mansion Commission and Foundation, Mrs. Sanford also oversaw the Lace House interior refurbishment project in 2003 and the home has now been successfully reopened for rental and public use—generating more than \$150,000 in funds to support the historical properties on the Mansion Complex grounds.

Mrs. Sanford is passionate about the role that good nutrition and regular physical activity play in helping to prevent cancer and other chronic diseases. In 2005, the First Lady launched the Healthy SC Challenge, a results-based initiative designed to help South Carolinians quit smoking, eat healthier and start exercising.

Mrs. Sanford currently serves on the Hollings Cancer Center Advisory Committee at MUSC as well as the Site Advisory Council for Drayton Hall historical property in Charleston. She has served as a board member on other non-profit organizations including the Coastal Community Foundation and the MUSC Children's Hospital Advisory Fund.

During her husband's second term as governor, Mrs. Sanford plans to spend more time in her most important role as mother of their four sons Marshall, Landon, Bolton and Blake.



About...

Carl S. Anthony

Carl Sferrazza Anthony, author of ten books, is the nation's expert on presidential wives and families and their political impact. With a history and journalism degree from George Washington University, his work began with researching at the Library of Congress and writing a definitive two-volume history, *First Ladies: The Saga of the Presidents' Wives and Their Power, 1789-1990*, published in 1991.

In 1985, after reading his work in the *Washington Post*, Nancy Reagan's chief of staff hired Anthony as speechwriter to the First Lady; he served in this capacity during the time she had great influence over the President's staff and budding friendship with Mikhail Gorbachev. Anthony went on to interview the President and Mrs. Ford for numerous articles and other stories. Anthony also came to know former President and Mrs. Nixon and conducted written interviews with them. He also interviewed Lady Bird Johnson and her family on numerous occasions, the George Bushes and Mrs. Carter. He conducted a joint Oval Office interview with George W. Bush and Laura Bush in May of 2004 for *American Heritage's* 50th anniversary issue, and a joint Oval Office interview with Bill and Hillary Clinton in the magazine's 40th anniversary issue.

Having also worked for the White House Preservation Fund, Anthony was appointed Historical Consultant to the Smithsonian Institution's Museum of American History to redefine the old exhibit on the First Ladies and emphasize their political and public roles. He also serves as consulting historian and on the board of the National First Ladies Library.

Anthony has written extensively for numerous national and regional publications including *Newsweek*, *New York Times*, *Los Angeles Times*, *Chicago Tribune*, *Boston Globe*, *Vanity Fair*, *Smithsonian*, *Town & Country*, and *Reader's Digest*. From 1985 to 1990, he wrote regularly for the *Washington Post* placing contemporary presidential news into historical context.

Now in Los Angeles, he is writing numerous feature films, documentary and television projects, in addition to his continuing work as a biographer and writer. He was a producer on *Showtime's* television movie *The Reagans*.

A political independent, Carl Anthony strives to understand and reveal the Presidents and their families as human beings—with all the attributes and deficiencies that come with that. He presents them as people, struggling to find their own place in history, with all the responsibilities that come with living at 1600 Pennsylvania Avenue.
